Forty kilometers north of Cuzco, in Peru's Sacred Valley, near the town of Maras, are a complex of salt ponds that have been producing salt since pre-Inca times. Salt and mineral-rich subterranean streams are channeled into hundreds of ponds on terraced hillsides, where the mountain air evaporates the water, leaving salt crystals to be harvested by hand. These salt ponds and the lifeworlds they support are the subject of complementary bodies of work by American photographer Laurence Salzmänn, exhibited here in the United States for the first time.

Made between 2016-2020 in multiple visits to Peru, including a four month period during which Salzmänn was a Fulbright Fellow, these photographs explore the contemporary forms of an ancient Quechua-speaking world. This world is characterized by an extraordinary symbiosis of natural beauty, human ingenuity, and ecological wisdom. Salzmänn's black-and-white photographs of the salt ponds are ethereal and abstract, inviting open-ended contemplation. His color photographs of the people of Maras are not an effort to "capture" the *mestizaje* society, rather something like the reverse—an effort to release it into pictures. If each day Salzmänn spent in Peru were like a piece of fruit, his photographs are like drops gently squeezed from them, one by one: none captures the whole, but each concentrates something of the whole in itself. - Jason Francisco

Yolanda Carbajal Zuniga, from a Quechua-speaking family, lives in Cuzco. She is a graduate in archeology from the National University San Antonio Abad of Cuzco and is now working on a master's degree in Management of Cultural Heritage at the same University. In 2016, Laurence Salzmänn asked her to be his assistant for the photographic and teaching projects that were part of his Fulbright Fellowship. One result of this collaboration is the text she created for Laurence's *Misk'i Kachi // Sweet Salt* photographs. This text provides yet another window for understanding the Andean culture of her ancestors.

Ann H. Peters is an anthropological archaeologist whose research focuses on the Central Andes (Peru, South America), specializing in historic and prehistoric textiles and the society and culture called Paracas. Over the past 40 years, she has collaborated in human rights campaigns, particularly advocating for the dignity and self-determination of the Maya and other weaving communities in the Americas. In both professional and activist contexts, her practice is bilingual and transcultural.
